Lotus and Coloma Protect the Mt. Murphy Road Bridge

Cal.net works to stay involved in the communities we serve. A recent issue that has gained a lot of attention is the proposed reconstruction of the Mt. Murphy Bridge. In a Google Group, a community member expressed her concern stating that an agency, "is considering tearing down the old, historic, wooden Mt. Murphy Bridge and building a new one a little ways away. El Dorado County's General Plan calls for all departments to conserve our rich history. I can't think of any place in this county that is more rich in history than Coloma, Sutter's Mill. It is famous around the world!"

This rich conversation then proceeded to discuss the merits of...

... modernization for safety and traffic, as well as the need to preserve history and heritage in our communities. Community members on this virtual forum were enabled to freely discuss the pros and cons of this project. Additionally, the details for public meetings conducted by the Transportation Division of the El Dorado County Community Development Agency were shared and the community was invited to provide feedback so informed decisions could be made.

After the meeting, another community member commented saying, “After introductions of DOT staff, Project Overview and discussion of the current bridge conditions, existing sufficiency issues, maintenance and funding, the public was invited to give their input. There were many concerns voiced ranging from accessibility during construction to use of

materials and design and site location. I hope that whatever the outcome, replacement or repair, this presents a golden opportunity for us to work with DOT and get the best possible bridge to serve our needs, enhance the beauty of our community and carry us into the next century.”

From the observer’s standpoint, this is community in action. Cal.net is a local company that is owned and operated by El Dorado County residents. Our families have all enjoyed many hours of play in Lotus Henningsen Park, and our children have learned about our history on school trips in Coloma. To Cal.net, the responsible management of this rich historical area is a very important matter.

“Wildlife” (Cont.)

... work to nurse hurt or out of place animals back to health. Originally a division of Sacramento Wildlife Care in 1990, Sierra Wildlife Rescue (SWR) was formally established in 1992 as the need for wildlife rescue grew in El Dorado County. Led by a group of 85 dedicated wildlife rehabilitators, veterinarians and supporters, SWR helped 350 wild animals throughout El Dorado, Sacramento and Yolo Counties during its inaugural year.

Orphaned songbirds accounted for nearly 50% of these wildlife rescues. So, in 1996 SWR opened its first “Baby Bird Nursery” where teams of volunteers worked 12 hour days to feed and care for these orphaned birds. Today’s Nursery treats approximately 650 infant birds each season (April-August) and serves as SWR’s Center for education and training classes.

Beyond orphan songbirds, all other avian species as well as mammals are cared for by in-home rehabilitators who serve a host of wildlife creatures including raptors, such as owls, hawks, falcons and doves; corvids, songbirds, waterfowl, game-birds, pigeons, squirrels, rabbits, fawns, skunks, opossums, foxes, coyotes, bobcats and raccoons. Nearly 1,000 other wild animals are rescued yearly and nearly 5,000 wildlife assistance calls from the public are handled.

Suffice it to say, this is an amazing organization and Cal.net is proud to be able to help by providing free Internet and free web hosting. We have also offered our web development program to them on an ongoing basis.

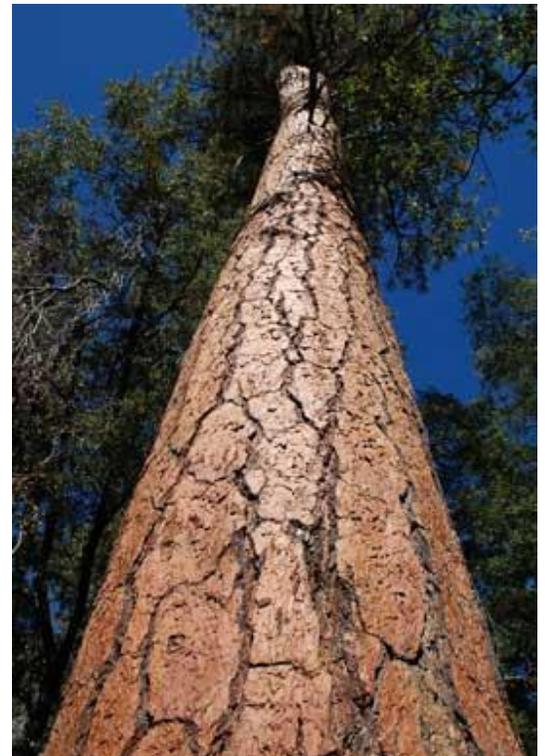
Tree Installations: How it might be for you.

Recently, Cal.net has been partnering with local arborists to mount radios high in Ponderosa Pine trees. By utilizing these “natural towers,” many subscribers who would be stuck with slow and cumbersome satellite Internet have been able to get Cal.net’s Velocity High Speed Internet.

Because wireless Internet is a line of sight technology, many El Dorado County residents have been able to improve their service by moving devices from their roof tops into the trees, thus clearing the canopy that limited service, and opening up their options! The best part is the simple process.

First, the homeowner or resident hires a tree climber, either someone they know, or from a list provided by Cal.net. Second, a Cal.net technician meets the tree climber on site to provide technical guidance. Once the signal is confirmed as good, the tree climber mounts the device in the tree and our technician completes the install into the home and, “Viola!” you have the fastest and most reliable wireless Internet available in El Dorado County!
